MEETING: Executive Committee Meeting – Friday, February 16, 2024

SUBJECT: Executive Director Report

POSSIBLE ACTION:

SUMMARY/DISCUSSION:

Updates on key activities are included below.

a. Sustainability Update:

- Federal, State, and local Funding and Leveraging
 - Exploring several funding streams:
 - We are waiting to hear about application for Children and Youth Behavioral Health Initiative (CYBHI) -- Round 3 – Early Childhood Wrap Around services with Centro Binacional for PAT (Parents as Teachers) home visiting services. If funded, the grant will support the start-up of a PAT affiliate with Centro and F5MC to continue serving as the capacity builder/connector for PAT services in the county. It will also provide some compensation for the other PAT providers in the county to mentor Centro as they start their program.
 - F5MC's application to the Alliance (Central California Alliance for Health) for care coordination (CHW) services was accepted. In a parallel process, F5MC is working with state contractors to ensure that we are HIPPA compliant and prepared for Medi-Cal billing prior to initiating this program. F5MC is also exploring other CalAIM options including serving as a HUB for Enhanced Case Management (ECM) to help our Funded Partners bill for care coordination services.
 - As part of that effort, F5MC was invited to be part of a grant the Health Department is submitting to provide the resources to establish an ECM HUB.
 - F5MC is also collaborating with MCHD on two home visiting grants. One is an Innovation 2.0 grant (funded by DHCS) which will add a REDI component for home visiting training and one that would support coordination/collaboration across home visiting programs in the county (funded by the Alliance). We received word that the Innovation 2.0 grant was awarded and are working on contracting with Health Department.
 - In addition, F5MC is working with the Alliance to establish home visiting itself as a billable Medi-Cal service under the plan.
 - Collaborating with State Agencies
 - F5MC continues to work with the First 5 Association and F5CA Commissioners to support
 statewide sustainability efforts and participated in Advocacy Day earlier this month where there
 were three asks: 1) One-time Funding request to support First 5 declining revenues while longterm sustainable approaches are identified: 2) Establishment of a workgroup at the state level
 focused solely on 0-3; 3) Continuous Medi-Cal coverage (see Items 3a, 3b, and 3c).

- o Local Agencies
 - Staff is reaching out to local MHSA staff to explore whether additional funding exists for IFECMH mental health training for future fiscal years. There is currently a waitlist for the current IFECMH Transformational Leadership Training and it is time to begin planning for next year.
- o Individual Donors/ Grants
 - F5MC received a grant from the local grantmaking department of the David and Lucille Packard Foundation in the amount of \$150K. Staff has reached out to the national staff to explore when the funding from the national strategies for early childhood development will be released.
 - F5MC applied for \$425K from the Monterey Peninsula Foundation through the application process that was due on December 1st. Staff does not expect to hear about award until April 2024.
 - Monterey will be one of the counties that the Packard Foundation will be focusing on for their new Children and Families initiative. The initiative "will work to ensure the systems that support moms, families, and children are stronger, better connected, and more equitable. We will expand our focus on young children to include pregnant people and moms, recognizing that a healthy start for children begins with healthy moms and healthy births. And we will focus on reducing racial disparities in outcomes because the future we envision one in which all children and families thrive is not possible while such stark inequities persist." F5MC Staff is connecting with Packard staff to ascertain what that might mean for F5MC programs and approaches.

b. Strategic Plan Implementation Update

• Program and Operations Highlights

- i. F5MC will be presenting at two sessions at the First 5 California statewide conference in March. One related to IFECMH and one related to movement toward Medi-Cal billing.
- ii. The Big Lil has completed their operations staffing assessment and F5MC staff is reviewing the recommendations.
- iii. Program Consultant Lindsay Bellows is developing position descriptions for the two program positions that are currently vacant.

c. Other Updates

FIRST 55 ASSOCIATION OF CALIFORNIA

BUDGET REQUEST

The First 5 Association of California (F5AC) is requesting a one-time \$100 million investment to ensure local programs serving California's babies, toddlers, and preschoolers stay intact. This one-time funding request would be allocated to First 5 programs throughout the state and focus on the highest priority areas:

- Family strengthening programs such as family resource centers, fatherhood programs and home visiting.
- Infant and early childhood mental health services for young children and their caregivers, and workforce training.
- Child care and early learning supports such as provider coaching, mentoring, and stipends.

PROTECTING CRITICAL SERVICES FOR

CALIFORNIA'S YOUNGEST CHILDREN

SERVICES FOR CHILDREN AND FAMILIES AT RISK

For 25 years, local First 5 programs in every county have supported the healthy development and school readiness of millions of California children. Already declining tobacco tax revenues that fund First 5 programs have been dramatically slashed since Proposition 31 (the flavored tobacco ban) was implemented last year. F5AC's tobacco tax revenue projections estimate **First 5s will need to cut \$123.7M** in early childhood community investments over the next two fiscal

years and \$422.9M in the next five fiscal years.¹ The need is urgent— more than 42% of First 5s have already made program cuts this year and 60% are planning on program cuts in 2024-25.²

Without a short term, stopgap investment from the state, programs serving tens of thousands of low-income children and children of color will end. California's babies, toddlers, and preschoolers should not bear the impact of the flavored tobacco ban in the form of fewer services and opportunities for healthy development.

PROTECTING CRITICAL SERVICES FOR CALIFORNIA'S YOUNGEST CHILDREN



PRESERVING FIRST 5 INFRASTRUCTURE

Local First 5s make up a statewide, 58-county network of early childhood service providers, case managers, grant makers, program coordinators, trusted messengers, researchers, advocates, and effective public stewards of state and local funding. **Together this network impacts the lives of more than 1 million kids, families and caregivers each year.**³

In addition to community program cuts, operational reductions in this network mean First 5s cannot **coordinate** local early childhood services like home visiting or serve as contract managers for CalAIM (California Advancing and Innovating Medi-Cal) community partners. In addition, because First 5s **leverage** funds to match other local and state funding, every tobacco tax dollar lost reduces funding available to serve California's children and their families Finally, as statewide **innovators** of early childhood best practices, a dwindling infrastructure will disproportionately impact the state's most vulnerable children.

PRENATAL TO 3 WORKING GROUP LEGISLATIVE PROPOSAL

THIS BILL

First 5 Association of California proposes a bill to establish a statewide Prenatal to Three Workgroup to craft evidence-based and community-informed recommendations for a 10-year comprehensive, equityfocused prenatal to three system policy agenda.

ISSUE

California has made important strides in supporting young children and their families. The Master Plan for Early Care and Education and Whole Child Screening Tool established by AB 2832 (2022) made great strides but were primarily focused on early childhood education and childcare leaving significant gaps.

Additionally, services are unequally provided throughout the state by a patchwork of providers. Some are Medi-Cal eligible, but lacking providers and others are administered by counties as resources are available.

There is room to tailor services to communities, while ensuring equity in the services available to children across the state.

It is time to focus on the needs of California's infants and toddlers and their families and address their needs comprehensively.

Policies also need to uplift family and community strengths and affirm their cultures and languages given that 75% of our state's 0-3 population are children of color.

SOLUTION

This bill would help California move towards more effective, universal, and equity-focused systems and services for infants and toddlers.

The bill would establish a 12-person working group to review current policies and practices at the state and local level related to infants, toddlers, and their families and make recommendations for improvements at all levels. The working group's review and recommendations shall focus on the following:

(1) Early childhood systems, including local First 5 infrastructure and needs.

(2) Outlining additional recommendations for system building, including financing, data, and the needs of specific sub-populations of young children.

(3) Working with state agencies to ensure alignment and partnership so that all of California's young children and their families can thrive.

The workgroup shall submit its recommendations to the Administration and to the Legislature by January 31, 2026.

Press Statement Governor's January Budget and Children's Continued Medi-Cal Coverage

For Immediate Release: January 10, 2024

A coalition of organizations – including American Academy of Pediatrics-Califorina, Children Now, First 5 Association of California, March of Dimes, Maternal and Child Health Access, National Health Law Program, The Children's Partnership, and Western Center on Law and Poverty – urges the Administration greenlight the implementation of an important protection to keep low-income kids healthy.

California is one of the first states in the country to adopt a multi-year continuous Medi-Cal coverage protection for young children. This means that children under the age of five can keep their Medi-Cal coverage without a gap in that coverage – often caused by administrative paperwork hurdles. With Medi-Cal covering more than half of all children in California, and given that almost three out of four Medi-Cal children are children of color, continuous coverage protections ensure children of color have a healthy start in life.

Gaps in coverage lead to missed essential health care, including vaccinations and early identification of developmental delays and interventions. By contrast, protecting Medi-Cal coverage in the first 5 years of life, when 90 percent of brain development occurs, can set a child on a course for healthy development.

Continuous coverage has proven to be extremely effective, even in challenging times. During the pandemic, the uninsured rate for California children dropped from 3.6 percent to 3.2 percent—an 11% percent drop. Continuous coverage not only protected children from becoming uninsured, it reduced the uninsurance rate, *even during a pandemic*.

We appreciate that the projected state budget shortfall may require state policymakers to curtail new investments and focus on preserving the investments already made. However, moving forward with multi-year continuous coverage not only protects young children's healthy development, it also preserves existing state investments in children's mental health and the Administration's strategic priorities in early childhood development. Children cannot benefit from these investments if they lose their Medi-Cal coverage.

Medi-Cal coverage protections have never been more important. Almost 200,000 California children have already lost their Medi-Cal coverage from July to October 2023 as part of the unwinding of the federal Medicaid continuous coverage protection. California's young children need the state's multi-year continuous coverage protection to go into effect as soon as possible.

To meet a January 2025 start date for continuous coverage, we urge the Governor to greenlight this policy as soon as possible, so the Department of Health Care Services can take the necessary steps for implementation. The State should submit a request for federal approval to the federal Medicaid agency as soon as possible–not waiting until the Spring to submit.

The Governor's immediate action on this will help prevent more children from unnecessarily losing health coverage in the coming years, and ensure California does not get left behind as similar policies are being implemented in other states (including <u>Oregon, Washington,</u> <u>Massachusetts, New Mexico, North Carolina, Arizona, Hawaii, and Pennsylvania</u>). Our organizations look forward to continued engagement with state partners on the timely implementation of this important policy.
