What happens in the FIRST 5 years of life shapes lifelong learning. From birth, children are building critical brain connections. For young children, relationships and positive interactions with their parents and caregivers form the essential foundation for healthy development. For nearly 20 years, First 5 Monterey County has invested funding from Proposition 10 in local agencies delivering researchbased programs that foster growth in social, emotional, language, physical, and thinking skills for children ages 0 through 5. We also invest in training and resources for our professional workforce and advocate for policies and practices that create communities where young children and their families can thrive.

## Parenting: Strengthening Families

Children don't come with instructions! Our funded programs help parents nurture strong connections with their child and community. Through playgroups, parenting classes, and home visiting programs, parents understand their child's unique development and nurture a strong parent-child bond with positive day-to-day interactions. Parents develop knowledge, confidence, and abilities that support their child's success in learning, communication, and relationships. Programs also connect families to local resources. Parents participating in First 5 Monterey County funded programs

saw strong improvements in parenting skills.

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# Capacity Building: Mental Health

First 5 Monterey County invests in specialized training and reflective practice opportunities to support a broad range of practitioners focused on the well-being of infants, young children, and their families. The Infant-Family Early Childhood Mental Health (IFECMH) Training Series works to build a range of skills that include promotion, preventive intervention, and treatment. Through cross-disciplinary interactions, 123 participants built connections and common understandings among providers working in mental health, health care, early care and education, and other systems.

**IFECMH Impacts** 

Nearly **100%** increased or deepened their knowledge of how to work with children and families as a result of the IFECMH training series.

> **95%** applied some of the knowledge learned from IFECMH trainings to expand ways in which they work with children and families.

"The session in which we covered fatherhood increased my awareness of how we engage fathers when meeting with families in their home. I've been more intentional about the way I include a father in visits/meetings. So much more information has been gained from giving them this opportunity."

# Improving Child Care Quality: Launching Quality Matters



Quality early care and education is a key component to a child's success in school and life. During the 2015/2016 fiscal year, First 5 Monterey County joined a collaborative of early learning partners to launch Quality Matters. Administered by the Monterey County Office of Education and the Monterey County Child Care Planning Council, Quality Matters uses a statewide system developed by the California Department of Education and other partners (known as the Quality Rating and Improvement System or QRIS) to assess program quality.

Through this work, Quality Matters provides tools, resources, and support to achieve high standards in family- and center-based child care programs that encourage small group or class sizes, a safe and healthy learning environment, and developmentally appropriate learning activities. Parents are also given tools and resources to select the best program for their child while educators receive professional development opportunities to help improve the quality of their services.
